Public Health Alert

Meningococcal disease:

The strain of meningococcal disease in the 12 year old child who died on Monday has been confirmed as Group C. This brings the number of cases of Group C meningococcal disease since August to four.

Regional Public Health will be advising parents of children at Evans Bay Intermediate School that there are vaccines available for Group C meningococcal disease. However these are not funded on the national immunization schedule.

There are likely to be a number of enquiries to general practice from parents who wish to have their children vaccinated against Meningococcal Group C. We have sent you information on meningococcal disease, including the vaccines, earlier this week. This information is also available on the IMAC website:

To: Students, Parents/Caregivers of Students and Staff at Evans Bay Intermediate School

We are aware that this is a difficult time for all of you. This letter is to confirm that laboratory tests have identified Amanda Crook-Barker had Group C Meningococcal disease. Group C and Group B are the most common strains causing disease in New Zealand, this year there have been 7 cases of meningococcal disease in the Wellington region, 4 have been Group C.

Note: Group C vaccination is different to the MeNZB vaccine that children/ teens received in NZ programme between 2004 and 2008. The MeNZB vaccine programme was to stop the outbreak of a specific type of group B that was causing most disease at that time. The protection from this vaccine was not long lasting.

Some families maybe wondering about the group c vaccine, there are several vaccines available against Group C disease. Group C vaccines are <u>not</u> one of the vaccines children are routinely offered in New Zealand. The group C vaccination costs approximately \$50 to \$150 plus the consultation/ administration fee at local medical centres. If you want to get this vaccine for someone in your family most medical centres would need to order in the vaccines, please call your medical centre to confirm the availability and cost.
