## 1 NEW information: 2019-nCoV is notifiable to the Medical Officer of Health

From today (Thursday 30 January 2020) 'novel coronavirus capable of causing severe respiratory illness' will be added to Section B of Part 1 of Schedule 1 of the Health Act 1956. This will make 2019-nCoV an infectious disease notifiable to the Medical Officer of Health. The Ministry of Health appreciate that this is short notice, but Cabinet decisions required to make this change were only taken on Tuesday this week.

## 2. UPDATED Information: Travellers recently returned from Hubei province

Due to the evolving evidence and data on coronavirus transmission the Ministry of Health advise people who are at high risk of exposure because they have recently been to Wuhan or Hubei province is that they should **self-isolate for 14 days after leaving Hubei province.** This means avoiding situations that could facilitate the transmission of the virus such as social gatherings and events where there is contact with others in particular, child care/pre-school centres, primary and secondary schools (including staff and students), aged care, healthcare facilities, prisons, public gatherings.
