Health star ratings

Health Star Ratings are a quick and easy way for you to choose healthier packaged foods.

The more stars, the healthier the food

Health Star Ratings rate the nutrition content of packaged food from half a star to 5 stars. The more stars, the healthier the food.

Here's what Health Star Ratings look like:







Use Health Star Ratings to compare similar packaged foods

The stars make it easier for you to choose healthier products.

Health Stars give you an independent, quick and simple way of comparing similar packaged foods so you can make a healthier choice.

Most packaged foods can get a Health Star Rating.

Health Star Ratings are voluntary so you won't see them on all packaged foods but you'll see Health Star Ratings appear on more products over time.

Hot health topics

Zika virus is a virus that is spread by some kinds of mosquitoes. The mosquitoes that can spread Zika virus are not normally found in New Zealand, but they are found in many countries around the world. If pregnant women are infected with Zika virus it can cause harm to their developing baby.

Most people who get infected with the Zika virus do not show any symptoms. Those who do feel sick experience symptoms that include: a low-grade fever, joint and muscle pain, a rash, headache and red eyes.

Currently the mosquito that carries the Zika virus is not in New Zealand, find out where the virus is **HERE**.

> Summer hay fever

Annual immunisations school programme

The programme is delivered in the school setting by a team of Registered Nurses, who have been providing this service for many years.

- Year 7 Boostrix immunisation providing protection against diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (whooping cough). This is a booster dose, following on from early childhood immunisation given before starting school.
- Year 8 Girls receive the HPV/Gardasil immunisation providing protection against the Human Papillomavirus (HPV) and genital warts.
