
STEC (E. coli):

What you need to know

What is STEC?

E. coli are bacteria found in the gut of humans and animals. Most E. coli are harmless.

However, some E. coli produce a toxin (poison) that can make people very sick. Names for these toxic E. coli are VTEC, STEC, or E. coli O157.



Causes

- CONTACT WITH POO FROM SICK PEOPLE e.g. through nappy changing
- OR ANIMAL MANURE
 particularly farm animals
- DRINKING CONTAMINATED
 WATER
- DRINKING UNPASTEURISED (RAW) MILK
- EATING CONTAMINATED
 RAW FOOD







Symptoms

- SEVERE STOMACH CRAMPS
- MILD TO SEVERE
 DIARRHOEA (RUNNY POO)
 This may be bloody
- VOMITING



If others in your household have similar illness, they need to stay away from childcare, school or work until no diarrhoea or vomiting for 48 hours. For testing, contact us on 04 570 9002.

Who's at risk?

Most people recover in 5-7 days. Young children, elderly people and people with low immunity can get severe illness and serious complications.

What should you do?

- UNTIL FREE OF VOMITING OR DIARRHOEA FOR 48 HOURS:
 - Children must not return to childcare/kindergarten
 - Others should not go back to school or work
 - Do not prepare food for others
 - Children should bathe separately from others.
 Do not share towels
- WASH YOUR HANDS THOROUGHLY AND REGULARLY

Everybody in your home should do this



ILLNESS IS GETTING WORSE OR NOT GOING AWAY

Seek medical help if:

- NOT DRINKING FLUIDS OR NOT HOLDING DOWN FLUIDS
 Particularly children
- CHILDREN SEEM UNUSUALLY DROWSY OR CONFUSED
